In order to be able to understand this text, the student needs to have completed algebra I. (If your student struggled in Algebra, it is very possible that they will struggle in this course due to its high math concepts throughout the ENTIRE book.) This course is designed to be a first-year high school chemistry course and gives the student a rigorous foundation in chemistry, in order to prepare him or her for a college-level course. The course covers significant figures, units, classification, the mole concept, stoichiometry, thermochemistry, thermodynamics, kinetics, acids and bases, redox reactions, solutions, atomic structure, Lewis structures, molecular geometry, the gas laws, and equilibrium. Students who take and understand this course will be very well-prepared for a tough university chemistry course. The course covers such topics as the scientific method, designing experiments, simple machines, archaeology, geology, paleontology, biology, and human anatomy and physiology. Its scope, therefore, is quite wide. There are many hands-on experiments to do, and they all use household items. This lab is to be participated in based on the student using Apologia's Exploring Creation with General Science 2nd Edition at home throughout the school year. All labs that can be done in 2 15-week co-op sessions, will be done and will be taken straight from the text.

Outside of Class expectations:

Class Description: The curriculum has three parts: *Exploring Government* is a one-semester high school course that provides a half-year credit in government. Lessons cover Federal, state, and local government and also contemporary issues in government. Special emphasis is placed on the Biblical basis for government and on the U.S. Constitution. Each of the fifteen units is intended to be studied for one week. *We Hold These These Truths*, a volume of historic documents, essays, and speeches that are to be read in conjunction with the lessons and an optional *Quiz and Exam* book that has review questions over the lessons and readings, quizzes, and exams. By working through the entire curriculum, we believe that you will gain a good understanding of the purpose and function of the government.

There are review questions over the lessons and readings that will be assigned as homework each week; There is a multiple-choice quiz at the end of each unit that you as the parents can administer at home; and there are three short-answer exams, each of which covers five units that we will take in class. If you choose to do the quizzes at home each week I will get you the *Exploring Government* Quiz and Exam Pack with an answer key to all of these exercises.

The purpose in *Exploring Government* is to educate, to inspire, and sometimes to warn you concerning the governments of the United States, the individual states, and our local communities. As we understand the background, basis, and operation of American government on all levels, we are better equipped to remain prayerful, thoughtful, and involved with regard to government.

This class will include a minimum of one field trip. More information will be available during the first week of class.
